

Beal Family Update

Dear SPUMC.

Thank you so much for your faithful prayers and support. Your partnership truly enables the work that we do. We wanted to take a minute to update you on what's been going on in our lives.

Since July, Heather has been teaching a course on Field Methods, where students apply their linguistics training to real life situations. They work with a speaker of a foreign language (Russian, Swahili, or Waray—a Philippino language), gathering as much language data as they can. During this time, they also organize and analyze their data. Finally, they compile descriptions of the Phonology system (how sounds form words) and the Grammar system (how words form sentences) of their target language. This class helps students see what they can do in real language situations. Her students will move on to eventually work in Russia, Asia, Africa, Mexico and the Pacific. It's exciting to play a small part in the Bible Translation process in so many different areas of the world!

At the end of August, Bruce wrapped up the K5 Summer Program for elementary aged kids (missionary kids, students' kids, and local kids from ages 6 to 12). He shared Jesus with them and ministered to the unique needs of missionary children. It was a busy summer but everyone had a good time and learned from one another.

So, what's next? The most exciting change is that Heather has been asked to develop a new course that will train people in Oral Bible Translation. There

are societies so completely oral, that while they can be taught to read and write, it does not communicate with their heart. How can these groups learn about God and have a reference that is meaningful without resorting to changing their entire culture and mindset? One means that is effective is providing a Bible translation in an oral format—it's not just reading something that has been written, it's translating the Bible orally, which is then provided to the people in a digital format. It's an exciting new field and there are finally some resources and software programs that have been developed to meet this need.

Several of you have asked about the kids. They are doing great in Texas! We continue to homeschool them. In the summer they enjoyed cooling off in the center's pool, but now the pool here will be closed for the cooler season. Both kids are involved in the Missionary Kids Youth Group located here on the center, where they get to meet and hang out with other kids whose lives are as "weird" as theirs!

VIM @ UMCOR West

Hope and I were blessed to join our first VIM trip with 22 folks to support the western distribution center for UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) in Salt Lake City. Our VIM team is famous there because of the distance we travel for this mission. Brian Diggs, the director of the site, mentions us in his greeting to each volunteer group. Volunteers are the key to UMCOR's success. Besides Brian and Micah, who manages the warehouse, the daily preparation depends on VIM-type teams.

There was a sewing team who made 26 warming wraps during the week. Another team sorted two truckloads of donated supplies: school bags, supplies for newborns, and health kits. The team then packed over 7,000 health kits. 63,000 of these kits are going to Houston, Florida, Puerto Rico and Ukraine. Each kit is individually packed. We touched people locally and globally.

Besides hard work we enjoyed great fellowship and deepened friendships. We prepared and ate meals together. We worshiped and prayed with and for each other daily. We played games together so there was a lot of laughter. We prayed over and sent each pallet and wrap with love as we completed it. We were touched by Jesus on this mission and all the love he surrounds us with. Brian is a fantastic witness and we enjoyed many insightful testimonies during the week from him and Micah. We concluded the week with a communion service celebrating together why we are called to mission under the name of Jesus. We are his hands and feet and most importantly his heart. If you've never been part of a VIM team, maybe 2018 is the year for you. We'll keep you posted on the multiple opportunities to serve that we are planning.
