The kids are enjoying their summer. The pool at the center where we live opened, offering relief from the 109° temps. They've watched some summer movies and are getting to know our new dog.

This excitement in God, Jesus, and the church in action sustains their faith throughout the year. They move to a deeper understanding of God's love and grace. Being on the mountain top provides them with an awesome way to witness to others when asked about their summer vacation. And during the spring, their excitement in Christ is renewed as they look forward to another year of ASP and VBS.

Kids come to Vacation Bible School for a variety of reasons and from a variety of faith backgrounds. For some kids this is the first time they have heard of God who loves them unconditionally and is with them through it all. For others this is a high energy reminder that God is on their level whether they are in preschool or grade school, whether they are into athletics or the arts, whether school is a breeze or daily struggle. They learn the Bible truths through story and movement so each type of learner embodies the message. This week of VBS sticks with kids long after they are back into their usual routine. The music becomes ingrained into them (and their parents). Weeks after VBS, kids are reminded that when they struggle or feel lonely... Jesus rescues. They remember the joy of being on the mountaintop with Jesus at VBS!

ASP – Appalachia Service Project – literally takes our senior high youth to the mountains of central Appalachia. There they learn to put their faith into action as they repair homes for poor families. But the week is more than the hard work. ASP is a relational ministry; the youth meet people from a very different culture, learn acceptance and practice compassion. Many take significant steps in their faith journeys, as well as share their faith with the people there. Whether they are aware of it or not, they bring a new level of hope to the Appalachian people they meet. They are given the biblical foundation for service and participate in both Bible study and deep discussions. Most will tell you it is the best week of their summer, or maybe even their year! Many go on to volunteer with similar projects in college. Once you have been to the mountaintop, you feel the need to return!

We are all chosen by God for learning and service. When God calls, God also promises to bless us, our experiences, and the work of our hands. We are thankful that our young people can have these kinds of amazing experiences through the commitment of this congregation.

Rise Against Hunger is an international hunger relief organization that distributes food and life-changing aid to the world's most vulnerable, mobilizing the necessary resources to end hunger by 2030. Most meals are distributed to children in school feeding programs in poorer countries, enabling children to receive an education. Rise Against Hunger has a 4-star rating from Charity Navigator.

Missing Flags Return

You may have noticed that the US & Maryland flags have returned to the Sanctuary after an absence of a little over a year. Originally, they were removed during Lent of 2017 with the intention of being put back later that spring. But out of sight, out of mind, they remained unintentionally tucked away in a closet. When we (the staff) became aware of this later that summer and hadn't heard from anybody about their absence, we decided to keep them out a little while longer to see if they would be missed. In late October and early November, about 6-8 people expressed an interest in having the flags returned to the Sanctuary and we had some face-to-face and email conversations with individuals about this.

They remained out for Advent and Christmas so that the newly created candle banners could occupy the alcoves that they traditionally had been in. Then the Worship Committee took up the matter about where they should "live" on a more permanent basis at their January and March meetings earlier this year and the decision was made to move them to the Fellowship Hall.

This summer during the week of Fourth of July we heard from several more people who felt strongly that the flags should be in the Sanctuary and they were returned the following Sunday. The Worship Committee and Church Council may talk about this some more in the coming months, but for the time being, our plan is to have them in the Sanctuary the majority of the time unless there are liturgical reasons to move them out

temporarily (like Advent/Christmas or Lent/Easter). In these cases they will be displayed in Fellowship Hall and then returned to the Sanctuary at the end of that season. So now you know the story of the disappearing and reappearing flags!

If you ever have concerns or questions about something going on at the church, we encourage you to call, email or come in to talk with one of us. As a staff we try our best to lead faithfully and take seriously the many diverse opinions, perspectives and feelings that are represented in our congregation. We may not always agree on everything but my hope is that we will always listen openly to and expect the best from one other.
