We're Doing It Right


A recent presentation held at Severna Park High School entitled, "What If We Put Mental Health First? Now What?" addressed the need for attention to mental illness. It focused on teens and parental responsibility to lessen the pressure on their kids, learn to listen without immediate

judgement, increase the level of communication at home, encourage their children to relax and be themselves, and so much more.

Dr. Anna Mueller, Sociology Professor at the University of Chicago, has done extensive research on teen suicide.

That first Easter came as a big surprise.

These days, we prepare for Easter for weeks and months at a time. We fast for Lent, and we buy our dresses and suits. We decorate the church, we invite our neighbors, and we plan a big family Easter dinner. By the time Easter gets here, the choir has fine-tuned their "hallelujahs" and the lilies are just ready for their photo opportunity.

But that first Easter was a total surprise, because certain things - specifically Jesus things - were not where we expected them to be. Instead of buried in the tomb, Jesus was alive and walking through the garden, walking to Emmaus, walking on the beach - alive and walking, sharing love and communion with all.

That first Easter, Jesus' resurrection from the dead was just the start of the surprises. Far from the end of the story, Easter kicks off a movement of new life, where you never know where you might see God at work in the world.

These next few weeks, our worship will be focused on these miraculous movements of God. It's tempting to divide the world into sacred and secular. and to seek God only in those places traditionally deemed "holy." Yet, as those first disciples saw, God is full of surprises and cannot be contained. We're excited to see where the new life of Jesus shows up in our world, be it in popular music, literature, paintings, movies, or science. In addition to exploring these themes in worship, we'll live it out through an Art Exhibit, May 12-19, and a Coffee House on May 18, featuring original works from our congregation and our community.

As people of faith, we are blessed to have rich scriptures, where we can always find God's voice speaking truth to us. But in these next few weeks, I invite you to bring the scripture into conversation with other aspects of your life. As Barbara Brown Taylor reminds us, it was Jesus himself who taught us to learn about God's kingdom by paving attention to "the lilies of the field and the birds of the air, to women kneading bread and workers lining up for their pay." Our prayer is that as we bring the songs, stories, and science of 2019 into conversation with these ancient scriptures, we will hear God's voice speaking in new and different ways.

And maybe - just maybe - we will be surprised by new life.

Of all the suggestions she offered in her presentation was the idea that teens need a "support group" before tragedy occurs. When something awful happens, it seems that teens and parents have very few credible resources on which to draw for direction, understanding and renewal of hope. She said that if our teens had a solid, positive system of support on an ongoing basis, they would be more able to cope with disappointment and upset, as well as grow as capable young adults.

And that is when it occurred to me -- we are doing it right! All of our programs for children and youth are based on complete acceptance of our kids as worthy children of God. That can only set them on solid ground as they learn to accept themselves and develop a sense of morals and values.

But I want to highlight MYF, Methodist Youth Fellowship. This is a consistent, creative program where youth are taught that they are valued and gifted. There is intentional discussion of topics relevant to teens with emphasis on achieving positive outcomes. The youth themselves would tell you that this is a safe place where they can express opinions and beliefs without put-downs. They learn to interact with and listen to each other. Care and concern for every kid is stressed and offered liberally. There is also silliness and laughter; we are fraught with traditions so special to the youth. And above all, there is free expression of faith and prayer.

The beauty of MYF is due to 3 factors:

- 1) The grace of God and guidance from the Holy Spirit. We could not do this alone. We are inspired and encouraged by the creative Spirit of Jesus Christ.
- 2) An amazing group of volunteer "counselors" -- adults who, over the years, have given so much time, talent, and heart to see that our youth are growing, affirmed, and well-cared-for. I thank every one of them who have served and are serving.
- 3) Awesome teens with which to work! Our kids are smart, funny, caring, and committed. They make me laugh a lot and cry sometimes. They challenge me on critical topics. They are confident and capable and understand the need to value other people, including and especially those different from them.

We have what teens need (as do youth groups in most other churches around)!

God has been so good to us. If your youth are part of our program, keep them coming. If your youth are not attending, consider introducing them to MYF. As scores of alumni will tell you, "It made all the difference in who I grew up to be."

Unbridled Easter Joy

What a weekend of unbridled Easter joy! On Saturday several hundred kids and their families gathered for our annual EASTER EGGSTRAVAGANZA. After crafts and refreshments, children hunted thousands of eggs all over our property for a grand total of about 10 minutes. On EASTER SUNDAY, we started the day in the garden with our Sunrise Service, moved into the Sanctuary for 8am worship and it got crazy (in a great way) at 9:30am when we concurrently launched our NEW Family Service with 300 people in Fellowship Hall and squeezed 429 people into the Sanctuary for our Contemporary Service. We pulled out all the stops at our Festival Service -- brass, choir, organ -- and ended the day with a rousing Hallelujah Chorus at Noon. All in all, 1399 people worshiped with us (we may round up to 1400). Alleluia. He is Risen!

Traditional Plan Ruled Constitutional

The Judicial Council of the UMC (sort of our Supreme Court) met the last week of April and upheld the overall constitutionality of the Traditional Plan that was passed at the specially called General Conference in February which strengthened our prohibitions on clergy officiating at same gender weddings and the ordination of LGBTO+ individuals. Several of the individual petitions were ruled unconstitutional (such as the "loyalty to the **Book of Discipline**" requirements for Board of Ordained Ministry members and requirements that Boards of Ordained Ministry "conduct a thorough examination" specifically to determine if someone was LGBTO). Other individual petitions were upheld, such as the "Disaffiliation Plan" which would allow congregations the "limited right" to leave the denomination with their property (a major departure from current church practice) if there is significant disagreement of conscience with the UMC's stand on human sexuality. This would require a 2/3 vote of a Church Conference at the local level, a majority vote at the Annual Conference level and payment of current and following year's apportionments, among other things.

Across the denomination, particularly in the US and Europe, there continues to be great division and pushback against the Traditional Plan, including pledges of non-compliance by some annual conferences, at least one entire jurisdiction (the Western Jurisdiction) and some countries (Germany, Norway). There is renewed talk of giving the U.S. UMC

the same autonomy that is now afforded the Central Conferences (Africa, Asia, etc.) when it comes to adapting the <u>Book of Discipline</u> to their local contexts. Our Bishop LaTrelle Easterling and the BWC Discipleship Council have each issued strong statements challenging the rulings and pledge to continue to work for a more inclusive and just church.

In the face of what is being received as ongoing harm and outright discrimination in the LGBTQ+ community, local churches everywhere are redoubling their efforts to make it abundantly clear that evervone is a child of God - no exceptions -- and welcome in their faith communities. Our new Sacred Worth group is one part of this effort (see article below). It is unclear where all of this is leading us. This is a fluid situation that continues to unfold week by week. Please continue to hold the United Methodist Church in your prayers as we discern a loving, just and faithful way forward.
